


Simpson School




Sedan

Sedan

There was a store at the intersection of Big Bear Creek Road and Sedan Crabtree Road. This store was operated by Daniel Bondurant. Area residents would go to the store to "see Dan" which gives the settlement and the road its name of Sedan.

New owner of the School

The store at Sedan was later owned by Clyde Mercer. He also owned a blacksmith shop and butcher shop. When the school was closed in 1935 he bought it and moved it to his farm on Sedan Crabtree Road.

Moving the school

Jimmy McCall was about 14 at the time the school was moved and he recalls that many sycamore trees were cut and dressed to make rollers. The school was raised from its foundation, the rollers slid under the building, the foundation removed and the building moved across the field on the rollers to its present location. Jimmy's job was to tend the mule which turned a capstan which pulled the ropes which moved the school.

The school is now owned by Virginia Harness. Her daughter Shirley married John McClay and their son David uses the building as a chicken coop.

Lower Bear Creek

Lower Bear Creek is on John Johnson's property on Big Bear Creek Road. The original school was where his house is now. John and his father kept one wall of the school and added to it to build the remainder of the house. The lumber from the school was used to build an outbuilding which still stands on the property.














Upper Bear Creek

Upper Bear Creek was on Cramer Road where Mike and Tammy (Hamilton) Miller now live. Their home is built on the school foundation.



Old Big Run

The original Big Run School was on the hill where Irvin Jenkins home is now located. The road was up on the hill also. When the road was moved to the bottom of the hill, to school was also moved. On the 1918 topographic map it is listed as School No. 6













Big Run

Alonzo Montgomery lives where the Big Run school was. The Noel house – next door to Montgomery's down the road was a store at one time and a school was behind it. No pictures! Help!









Story Time




The bus did not cross the bridge because:

- 1. There was no bridge
- 2. The bus was too heavy for the bridge
- 3. The road was often impassable for the bus

Mt. Summit

Those who live there call it Freejack. It's at the intersection of Rockwell McCorkle Road (Wildcat Hollow) and Sedan Crabtree Road. The building was razed in 1984.


