

WORLD NEWS IRAN PROTESTS

The Iran protests are still continuing after the surprising death of Mahsa Amini made news, and the citizens of Iran are fuming. You may be wondering, why are they protesting and who is that? Mahsa Amini was an Iran citizen who was spotted walking out of a subway by the capital's city's Guidance Patrol.

Supposedly being "Improperly dressed" to the apparent standards, she was soon taken away to a detention center to be reeducated on how to dress properly to the religion. Three days passed and she died on September 16th.

This left Iran citizens in a rage, which soon led to them violently protesting still 40 days after the incident. As the protester death toll hits at least 234 protesters, fires continue to light the streets of Iran to fight for justice.

For our first installment of Author of the Week, the author chosen is Russian novelist and short story writer, Fyodor Dostoevsky. Dostoevsky wrote several lengthy novels, and they were quite popular. His full name is Fyodor Mikhaylovich Dostoyevsky and he was born November 11, 1821. He was born in Moscow, Russia, and his tales had a large influence on 20th century fiction stories. Fyodor Dostoevsky is at times said to be one of the finest novelists to exist because of the impact his novels had. Why was he such an astounding author? As quoted from Saul, "Literary modernism, existentialism, and various schools of psychology, theology, and literary criticism have been profoundly shaped by his ideas." This is why his novels had such an effect. Not only were they engrossing narratives, but they had helped to form some of the modern aspects of literature we have today. Numerous works of his had and are known for their psychological profundity, deep insight, showing the characters' descent into various forms of madness. 



History of Halloween

For this week's Sharp Moments, I'd like to discuss the upcoming holiday. Halloween, a day and night on October 31st of treats and fright, one of the most popular holidays in the United States of America. Millions of dollars are spent on the costumes Americans don to be creative and the candy they consume every year. Though, you may wonder, when did this holiday begin?

Over the many years it's existed, Halloween has been celebrated in many different ways and has been known by many different names. Halloween originated through Irish immigration in the 19th century. In the United States, Maryland was the first colony to participate in these practices all those years ago, though the tradition of Halloween can be traced back nearly 2,500 years ago to the ancient Celtic tradition of Samhain. Samhain was a tradition where Celtic citizens would dress in costumes and their priests would light massive sacred fires to ward off spirits of the deceased. Their New Year was November 1st, and it marked the end of harvests and summer as well as the beginning of the freezing, harsh winter that would occur. In their eyes, winter was associated with death, specifically, human death. Because of that, the day before their New Year, October 31st, was when the Celts believed the border of the living and dead blurred. This caused the ghosts of the dead to cause trouble and damage crops. Although, this was also the time when it was easiest for Celtic priests, Druids, to predict the future. The prophecies Druids spoke provided the Celts with comfort during the long winters. With the fires the Druids lit, individuals burned crops and animals as a sacrifice to appease the Celtic deities. Later, the Roman Empire had conquered the majority of Celtic land. In the 400 years the Romans had ruled Celtic land, the festivals of Roman origin had mixed with the tradition of Samhain. One of these festivals was Feralia, a day when Romans commemorated the death of individuals in late October. The second festival was a day to honor the Roman goddess of trees and fruit, Pomona. Her symbol being an apple with the festival having bits of Samhain incorporated into it is likely what caused bobbing for apples to become

In the Eighth century, Pope Gregory the Third made November 1st a time to honor all saints, which was originally on May 13th as declared by Pope Boniface the Fourth. This created All Saints' Day. When All Saints' Day had been mixed with Christianity's influence, All Souls' Day was formed. (Witches were perceived as evil entities by Christians, so that's how those iconic figures became so popular during Halloween.) All Souls' Day was similar to Samhain, having large bonfires, parades, and dressing up in costumes, these costumes being saints, devils and angels. Another name for All Souls' Day was All-hallows, which later became All-Hallow's Eve and, the holiday we all know and celebrate, Halloween.
